So much work and commitment by the above named, who embody the aims of U3A, of keeping active, learning new things in a social setting and using hard won skills and experience for the benefit of all.

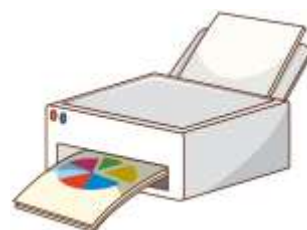
THANK YOU TOWNSVILLE CITY COUNCIL.

FRIDAY TALKS:

4th Aug. Dr. Bill Liang on “Climate Change—Sceptics and Science ”



This was a fascinating talk on Climate Change and the importance of accepting the scientific facts and de-bunking the sceptics' fears and non-belief by a presentation of up-to-date scientific research.

Bill was a great and entertaining presenter, who made this sometimes awkward topic informative and realistic. He also provided ideas for a renewable future for the planet and the populations who inhabit it.

11 August. “Brighter Lives Hospital Foundation ” Tanya Busoli

Tanya is the CEO at Brighter Lives Townsville Hospital Foundation, which is a not-for-profit organisation. The volunteers provide a range of support all across the hospital and regional district services. She engaged the small group about the community response to various fund-raising strategies to bring more funds to the community hospital projects, which includes vital up-to-date medical equipment. The annual Book Fair is one well-known event.

18 August. “Are you scam fit? Can you spot one?”. Carly Crompton



The **nbn Local Community Ambassador** provided a very insightful talk on National Broadband Network (Nbn) updates with tips about scams and hackers to see if you are Scam Fit, how to protect yourself from scams and who to contact if you think you have been scammed. The large audience was attentive and grateful for her time to raise awareness of these dangerous issues.

25 August. “Papua New Guinea how strategic was PNG for the Japanese during WW2”.

A visually and orally interesting presentation by **Graham Collins** that revealed amazing facts about New Britain and the Japanese war activities. The session was well supported by the interested audience with lots of Q&A discussion.

1st September 2023. “Nurse Next Door an In-Home Support Service”

A presentation about a new support service in Townsville: developed in Victoria, this service looks to close gaps in the current provision of home care. This organisation offers a range of support as well as palliative care alongside the care from the TUH Palliative care unit if needed. They state that this service is about maintaining health, and empowering people to live a full life. They plan to provide support to communities in the Hinterland as well as the Townsville district. An interesting opportunity to hear of a new service in our area for people interested in paying for extra care that is individually designed to meet their needs.

8th Sept. “Homeopathy: how it can help with age related health issues like allergies, arthritis, mental health”. Dr. Asha Kiran



Asha explained that Homeopathy is nature based, proven, holistic, non-toxic health care. Everyone is unique even if you have the same disease. Instead of unintended side effects, generally there are unintended benefits! There are **NO SIDE-EFFECTS**. It can work complementary with conventional medicine if the conditions are serious. An overview of the historical perspective and its popularity in Europe and other parts of the world was given.



15th Sept. How is NQ looking after its Natural Resources? Crystal Falknau

A passionate representative of the North Queensland Conservation Council (NQCC) Crystal spoke about the voice for the environment in North Qld, advocating on a wide range of regional environmental issues since 1974. This work is more important than ever given current global



22nd Sept. "The Orange Skye laundry Vans, their critical importance and how they help the many homeless even in our town".



Gary Ward spoke about the origin and founding people of **Orange Skye** and gave statistics on how many people use their services in Australia. They do not have clients or customers only 'friends'. Gary discussed and showed a van, locations, remote services and their connection in New Zealand plus why and how Gary got involved volunteering.

An important part of the service is simply to chat to people. He outlined how our members can also volunteer, which requires filling out outline forms processed in Brisbane followed by on-line induction. The venues that you will currently see the **Orange** vans around Townsville are: Tue—Salvation Army Riverway; Wed—Selectability Bike Shed Aitkenvale; Thur—Garbutt Community Centre; Fri—Townsville Food Pantry, West End; Sat—Police Beat, North Ward; Sat—Taihs Camp St, Mundingburra. Times generally vary between 9-11.30am with 2-hour shifts.



29th Sept. "Mental Health is so important today as many of us have either experienced ourselves or a loved one contemplating Suicide". Renee Ericson

Not realising the office is only attended in the morning, Renee did not have any of her prepared presentation printed out and so took questions from the floor and made an interesting time of it as she was very well informed on the topic and could answer any questions put to her with facts, figures and a broad range of information.

6th Oct. "Wondering what it's like to live & work in remote aboriginal areas".

Anne Thomson continued her saga of events after living on the Tiwi Islands and what happened next, which was to take up relief teaching in the Northern Territory, after feeling that the Tiwi experience equipped her with teaching skills to be of service to those who found it difficult to get staff to remote areas. A small group of active listeners participated in questions and answers put forward to Anne. Of particular interest were language and reading issues in local dialects and the amount of involvement in education by tribal elders plus funding issues for resources.



13th Oct. "Where are Townsville Community Hubs and how do they connect".

Jillian Sutcliffe was very informative, passionate, energetic, well presented and enthusiastic presenter about her role as coordinator of the Townsville branch of Community Hubs Australia, a not-for-profit organization. Jillian had loads of resources available about Community Hubs safe spaces established inside primary schools, at Kelso and Aitkenvale, which aim to work with the community for the community. The Hubs provides support for parents and children to access services and training that they would have been unable to do on their own. It also provides activities such as Playgroups, Study groups, Computer Literacy, AMEP English, Conversational English, Arts and crafts and Breakfast club and just Coffee and Chat and Well-Being.

20th Oct. "Working to save the Black Throated Finches from extinction".

Janet Robino from Bird Life Townsville, gave a talk about the endangered **Black Throated Finches**. Her talk to us was just before a planned bird count at a number of waterholes around our region. We learned about the struggle for survival with food and undisturbed safe places becoming more and more scarce. The finch is a ground feeder and although some spaces are available on some farms, they are often covered with weeds rather than the seeds required by the birds. The Black Throated Bird is so rare many people haven't sighted this very pretty and important bird.



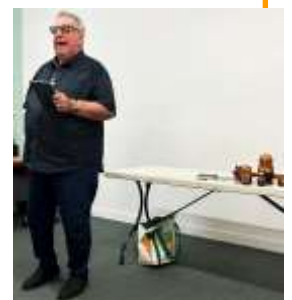
27th Oct. "Wills, Enduring Power of Attorney, Executors and Probate".

Over 40 people attended the talk, which went well over time as the engaged audience asked clarifying questions and sought answers to their own situations. Chris Mills was a lively presenter and provided leaflets to take away.

3rd Nov. "Demise of Russia". Tony Hallo

Tony gave a sincere and interesting talk on how he got involved in his ministry and church work going back to his parental influence and family life. He related to his official visits over the last 30+ years about what he had witnessed and experienced.

The artifacts added a show and tell component with story-lines that Tony delivered captivating his audience about the issues facing, Israel, Palestine and the Ukraine under various dictatorship regimes.



10th Nov. "Places in New Zealand you are very unlikely to have visited". Judy Knox.



Having worked as a volunteer for the Department of Conservation (DOC) for several years in out-of-the-way places that people are very unlikely to have visited such as Curio Bay working with yellow-eyed penguins, and a hut warden on the Kepler Track to name a couple, Judy was able to enlighten the audience of the highs and lows of working with inquisitive and sometimes disrespectful tourists plus some of the cheeky behaviour of wildlife.

17th Nov. "Teaching English in South Korea in 2001". Anne Thomson.



What a contrast city living with 3 million people in a winter snow country to the tropical and remote village life Anne was plucked from to live with her new husband only to be separated by 5 hours travel time and expected to share an apartment with a stranger. The language school offered local language support but students and Anne adapted well to language in the class



room with the added bonus of small hand-held translators. Of particular interest was how families related to the division of their country to the North and South; what to do if an air-raid noise is sounded, high student suicide rates and the warmth shown to foreigners.

The antics of those kids of mine, they never seemed to cease.

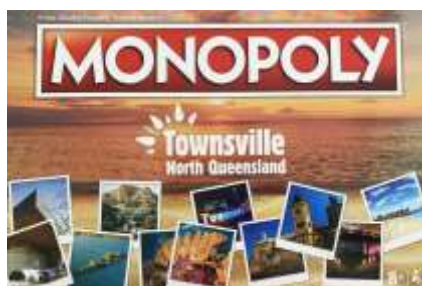
They'd run for cover, every one, and hope I'd soon calm down.
